Make it or do it!





We use 'do' for general activities.

What did you do at the weekend?



• I didn't do anything yesterday.

• She's fed up with doing everything herself.

Make

We use 'make' when we create or construct something.

- She makes a lot of money at her job.
- I've made us some coffee.
- Did you really make those cakes?
