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Phrasal verbs and Prepositional verbs

Part 1

Phrasal verbs are made up of a verb and a particle. This particle can either be an adverb or a preposition; sometimes a phrasal verb can have more than one particle. A prepositional verb is made up of a verb and a preposition. The main difference between phrasal verbs and prepositional verbs is that phrasal verbs are separable whereas prepositional verbs are inseparable.

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Phrasal verbs Phrasal verbs often have meanings which we cannot easily guess from their individual parts

- The book first came out in 1997. (was published)
- The plane took off an hour late. (flew into the air)
- The lecture went on till 6.30. (continued)
- It's difficult to make out what she's saying. (understand)

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Many phrasal verbs take an object

Examples

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• She brought up three kids all alone.

• I brought my children up to be polite.

In most cases, the particle may come before or after the object if the object is not a personal pronoun

Examples

• Do you want me to take off my shoes?

• Come in. Take your coat off.

Prepositional verbs

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Prepositional verbs have two parts: a verb and a preposition which cannot be separated from each other

- Did you search for the missing piece yet? be a none noom
- Grace is listening to music in her room.
- What do you know about physics?
- It's not easy to cope with failure.

Prepositional verbs always have an object, which comes immediately after the preposition.

Somebody broke into his car and stole his radio.

- Getting to the final depends on winning the semi-final!
- Somebody is knocking at the door

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Some prepositional verbs take a direct object after the verb followed by the prepositional phrase

• She reminds me of a girlfriend of mine. Able a rue r.com

- How can we protect children from dangerous things?
- I'd like to thank everyone for their kindness.

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• Not all phrasal verbs need an object.

- **Prepositional verbs always have an object after the** preposition
- With phrasal verbs the object can come before or after the particle if the object is not a pronoun.
- With prepositional verbs, the object is always immediately after the preposition
